DISSERTATION ABSTRACT

Here I refine and expand on existing descriptive accounts of jealousy the emotion, then explain its moral significance. In doing so, I emphasize the crucial role that relationships play in giving rise to jealousy. To explain its moral significance, I argue that in all cases, jealousy undermines the actual or potential moral value of the relationships between jealous subjects and the people who figure in their jealous desires; this provides a paradigmatic moral reason to criticize jealous subjects. Thus I unify moral criticisms of jealous subjects without just portraying them as selfish or insecure. I also criticize arguments that a person’s being jealous can be a moral reason to praise that person.
